LOOKING BACK AT LAST YEAR

This past 2018-2019 academic year was a complete success for the STEP Scholars TRiO (SSS) Program. This program, a support service program for students who are first-generation, low-income, or have a documented disability, has made progress since its establishment in 2016. With the eleven events that STEP organized, the program was able to have 550 contacts just through event programming alone. These contacts occurred through events such as our professional roundtables, the Imposter Syndrome Roundtable, the UC Davis Pre-Health Conference, and the California Forum for Diversity in Graduate Education.

Through one-on-one counseling, fellows were able to have 142 student contacts with their scholars. The contact the program has had with scholars has been particularly effective as scholars have demonstrated academic excellence. Exactly 88% of the program's scholars have been classified with good academic standing. The accomplishments STEP has surpassed are noteworthy. In the upcoming academic year, the STEP team wishes to surpass these numbers by increasing student-to-fellow contact in the hopes of increasing academic excellence amongst STEP Scholars. The team hopes to bring in fresh ideas to meet these goals as our new Retention Coordinator, Alexandra Chavez, and two new fellows, Alex Del Toro and Jasmine Posada, join the team.

STEPPING INTO A NEW YEAR

As the new academic year kicks off to a new start, STEP has implemented new changes to the program. First and foremost, STEP has decided to implement policies for their loan program. As of August 2019, STEP will now require its Scholars to sign off on a policy when checking out laptops, headphones, and test prep books. Furthermore, each of these check out items will also require time limits. Laptops will be available to check out for a period of four hours. Scholars will need to stay within the Bright Success Center during the time of usage. Clickers will be available for check out only for a given semester. They must be used solely for UC Merced courses that the Scholar is enrolled in. Kaplan books will also have a loan period of one week. However, exceptions can be made to check them out for longer periods of time. With this new policy in place, STEP wishes for more scholars to have the opportuity to loan out items.

Furthermore, in hopes of making the STEP program interactive, fellows have decided to take the initiative to make competitions amongst their cohorts. The Fellows not only want to gain stronger relationships with their fellows, but also hope that Scholars create relationships amongst themselves. Fellows will announce their team names during Fall Welcome. Throughout the academic year, Scholars will hold competitions amongst their cohorts. At the end of the academic year, the cohort with the most points will be awarded a prize during the STEP recognition event.

The STEP team hopes that these new adjustments to the program bring forth a sense of community in UC Merced's TRiO (SSS) program. The STEP team looks forward to meeting new scholars and welcoming back old scholars.
